

# The Independent School Curriculum Audit Checklist

*A practical tool for academic leaders preparing for accreditation, onboarding faculty, or assessing the current state of curriculum documentation.*

## 01 Documentation Completeness

- Every course has a written, up-to-date curriculum document that is accessible to school leadership.
- Course documents include scope & sequence, essential questions, and assessment descriptions.
- All curriculum documentation is stored in a shared, centrally accessible location — not in individual drives, email threads, or personal folders.
- Documents have been reviewed or meaningfully updated within the last two academic years.
- There is a clear owner (department chair or curriculum lead) responsible for each course's documentation.
- Documentation exists for electives and specialized courses, not just core academic programs.
- Faculty can locate any course document independently without having to ask a colleague.

## 02 Alignment & Coherence

- Courses are explicitly mapped to relevant standards, benchmarks, or institutional learning goals.
- Vertical alignment between grade levels and divisions is documented and visible across departments.
- Horizontal alignment — connections between courses taught in the same year — is identified and recorded.
- Cross-departmental or interdisciplinary connections are captured somewhere in the curriculum documentation.

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- The school can demonstrate clear alignment between its stated mission, core values, and what is actually taught.
- Alignment gaps (standards or goals that are under-addressed) have been identified and are being actively addressed.
- Department chairs can articulate how their courses connect to the broader academic program without consulting documents.

### 03 Accreditation Readiness

- Curriculum documentation could be presented in full to a visiting accreditation team within 48 hours.
- The school can generate a summary of curriculum coverage by department, division, or grade level on demand.
- Self-study narratives are supported by actual curriculum data — not anecdotal or reconstructed from memory.
- There is a documented, ongoing curriculum review process that does not rely solely on accreditation cycles.
- The school can demonstrate how curriculum has evolved or improved since the last accreditation visit.
- Standards alignment documentation meets the expectations of your accrediting body (NAIS, SAIS, MSA, or regional equivalent).

### 04 Institutional Continuity

- If a department chair or veteran teacher left tomorrow, their course documentation would remain fully accessible and usable.

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- New faculty have a clear, structured onboarding path for understanding existing curriculum — they are not relying on informal conversations.
- Institutional knowledge about curriculum decisions (why courses were designed a certain way) is captured in systems, not just in people’s heads.
- Course history and prior iterations are preserved and retrievable for context and continuity.
- The school’s curriculum documentation would survive a significant faculty transition without meaningful loss.

20–25 ✓	Your documentation is strong. You are well-positioned for accreditation visits and faculty transitions. Focus on maintaining the system and closing any remaining gaps.
